IN THE FIELD

Waterlands Retriever Club fun day included competition in bench, obedience and field work.

In the gun dog stake, tests required the dogs to quarter in the field in order to flush game planted there. Once the bird was in flight the handler or a companion shot the bird, which the dog then retrieved and delivered to hand. Barbara Starkey and her dog, KELHATCH TABITHA OF POWHATAN, won this competition.

In the "steady stake" dogs competed in three series of tests. The first two tests involved single birds shot in fields with heavy cover. The third test was on the water where two ducks were thrown consecutively so that the dog retrieved one bird, delivered to hand and on command set out to retrieve the second bird. A dog who set out to retrieve before the handler gave a command was disqualified. KELLY OF MONTGOMERY, owned and handled by Brian McCreesh, won this stake. KELHATCH TABITHA OF POWHATAN took second. GATHERGAME'S TRUST, also owned and handled by Barbara Starkey, took fourth.

The opinions of judges, experienced exhibitors, trainers, club officers, etc. would carry weight. Although the flyer specifies May 1 as the deadline for replies, the time has been extended indefinitely. Ms. Badcliffe would be interested in our suggestions and expressions of support.

Southern California Dog Obedience Council

TO: PRESIDENTS, THE BOARD OF DIRECTORS AND MEMBERS OF COUNCIL MEMBER CLUBS

In order that Obedience accomplishments be accorded the same Status and Recognition as Breed and Field activities, Council, with the approval of the Delegates on Feb. 14, 1974, asks that your club consider the Proposal of an OBEDIENCE CHAMPIONSHIP TITLE and forward any conclusions, suggestions or alternate plans.

The following is a Plan for obtaining the Title, as originated in 1969 by Mr. Phillip Ellithorpe (deceased 1974). Mr. Ellithorpe's Plan incorporates suggestions received by him from interested people throughout the country, that best fits training and exhibiting conditions in all parts of the United States. Note that no change in the present process of earning a Utility Dog Degree is proposed, and the Championship Title would be for SUPERIOR performance within the present framework of obedience requirements:

THE OBEDIENCE CHAMPIONSHIP TITLE

1. Three scores of 190 (or more) in Novice Class 3 Points
(Under 3 different judges)
2. Three scores of 190 (or more) in Open Class 3 Points
(Under 3 different judges but one (1) judge may be same as a Novice point)
3. Three scores of 190 (or more) in Utility Class 3 Points
(Under 3 different judges but one (1) judge may be same as a Novice point and one (1) judge may be same as an Open point)
4. Deficiencies of less than 190 (score) from ANY CLASS may be made up by scoring an equivalent number of 190 (or more) in either Open B or in Utility B at any time.
5. The Tracking Title would substitute for any two deficient scores in the regular Obedience Classes but no dog could achieve the Obedience Championship Title without a U.D. Degree.

OBEDIENCE CHAMPIONSHIP, cont.

6. A total of 9 Points is therefore required for the CHAMPIONSHIP TITLE.
7. A dog henceforth be known as a ~~DUAL CHAMPION~~ if any two championships are owned and a ~~TRIPLE CHAMPION~~ if all three championships are attained.

Suggestions, alternate plans or comments received from Member Clubs will be collated by a Committee, and presented to the Council Delegates for action. The final Proposal for an OBEDIENCE CHAMPIONSHIP TITLE as approved by the SCDOC Delegates, will be submitted to the AKC Obedience Department for consideration and action. "ONE BIRD FOR THE DOG"--reprinted from Hunting Dog

Gentlemen:

We at *Hunting Dog* are going to dust off an old idea for which we can take no credit. We regret that we cannot claim originality in this matter because, old though it may be, it is more than ever a great modern conservation idea. The thing that we are asking you to consider is particularly appropriate at this time, we believe, because of the very definite swing that the people of our continent have recently taken in their thinking toward conservation and ecology. We would like to call the idea to which this letter is addressed, ONE BIRD FOR THE DOG.

It seems to us at *Hunting Dog* that the time is *now* for the sportsmen of North America to be credited, encouraged and rewarded for their contribution to the conservation of the upland game birds of this continent by hunting them with a dog.

Let us hasten to make the point clear that our request for the consideration of this idea by each of our game departments is not a request for an additional bird for the bag. We full well recognize that the bag and possession limits for each kind of bird in every area of North America should rest squarely and completely on the shoulders of you gentlemen who are in game management and your biologist advisors. You fellows should set the bag limits; not the dog owners of your area.

The matter of ONE BIRD FOR THE DOG could be as neatly solved by making the bag limit one less bird for the non-dog hunter as it could be by adding one more bird for the hunter with the dog. Bird limits must be completely and entirely a decision of judgement between you gentlemen of the Game Commissions and the trained men who advise you. We at *Hunting Dog* believe that those decisions are in good hands. We ask you to remember, however, that the dog owners of this continent as sportsmen and hunters, contribute immensely to your first line of defense as conservationists.

In these days of national and international concern for conservation, here then is a chance for you fellows to show that when you say "conservation" you really mean conservation. Dog owners and other sound conservation people all know that there will be fewer birds downed and more birds found if the hunter will use a trained dog.

We believe ONE BIRD FOR THE DOG should work like this: When game people have decided that an area can stand an eight bird per day quail harvest, for example, we ask you to make the limit seven birds for the hunter and ONE BIRD FOR THE DOG. If only six birds could be safely taken perhaps you would want to set the limit at five for the hunter and ONE BIRD FOR THE DOG. In the same manner, pheasant or partridge or grouse limits could be handled. Perhaps two birds for the hunter and ONE BIRD FOR THE DOG would work for some areas. In others the daily bag could be one and one and in still others a safe bag limit would be three birds for the hunter and ONE BIRD FOR THE DOG.

We of *Hunting Dog* do not know of a single upland game bird, excepting the wild turkey, to which the ONE BIRD FOR THE DOG idea is not a sound principle. Dove, quail, pheasant, grouse, partridge, woodcock, ptarmigan; you name it and the use of a dog by the hunter is a conservation practice unquestioned by knowledgeable people. Here and now, we believe, is the time and the place to reward these conservation minded sportsmen who use dogs, for their efforts to extend the great recreational assets of our upland birds to their maximum values. Here and now is your chance to point the way for the non-dog hunter to become a better conservationist. Here and now is the time for all of us to assert that we really mean it when we say "conservation".

We at *Hunting Dog* would not advocate that game management people try to control the breeding or the training of the dog to be used. You would be on shaky ground on that matter much as dog people might be on shaky ground in trying to set bag limits. Just a dog, any dog, can and will adapt itself to hunting. Any sportsman who will take a dog hunting can benefit from that experience. Either the dog will start to adapt or the hunter will not continue to take the dog with him. We at *Hunting Dog* feel sure that a program such as ONE BIRD FOR THE DOG will encourage non-dog owners to become owners, and owners to become trainers, and trainers to produce better hunting dogs. Any way you look at a program like that; any way you cut it, our entire continent and the sensible use of its upland bird crop will benefit.

Dear Desperate,

Human cookies were always too sweet for my taste. I prefer dog cookies instead. I think Gus will enjoy their natural goodness, and they are much easier and cheaper to make too. The recipe is below. Try giving Gus his own cookie jar near his food and water dish. I think everyone will be happier.

DOG COOKIES

Mix together:

- 1 3½ oz. jar strained baby meat (I enjoy liver most)
- 4 heaping teaspoons dried milk powder
- 6 heaping teaspoons wheat germ
- 1 teaspoon honey

Roll in small balls. Flatten on greased cookie sheet.
Bake at 350 about 10 minutes.

(Taste tested and approved by Rick's Bright Shadow. Depend on the nature of your wheat germ you may need more than the recipe calls for. Just add enough so that the mixture feels right. L. M.)

"ONE BIRD FOR THE DOG," cont.

More birds will be found, fewer cripples lost and a conservation minded sportsman will evolve. It has often been said that good conservation is the result of a positive attitude. ONE BIRD FOR THE DOG will promote and develop that attitude not only in the hunter who uses the dog but it will also help convince non-hunters that we are dead serious about this business of conservation.

We at *Hunting Dog* would suggest that only one bird for each dog in the field be allowed. Two fellows with one dog should only be allowed to count the dog for one extra bird. With two dogs this twosome of hunters could each get a bonus bird of course. Each hunter would be allowed to count only one dog. A pack of hounds would rate only one bonus bird for one hunter. It would be unfair for a car load of hunters to take the neighbor's Peke and then each collect an extra bird. There would probably be some attempts at such "lap dog" abuse, just as there is now some abuse of road hunting, bag limits and other reasonable game regulations. In defense of just any dog however, the wife's fancy pants Schnauzer would qualify for ONE BIRD FOR THE DOG and most of us in the dog business will have to admit that any dog, the wife's blooded Schnauzer or a street mongrel of unknown breeding can often find a downed bird that men alone cannot find. The vast majority of interested hunters however, would probably migrate toward the sporting breeds.

Gentlemen, the net effect of ONE BIRD FOR THE DOG would be healthy for North America and our wildlife harvests to gain maximum human benefits. Such a program might well be hailed as the greatest contribution to wildlife management since the advent of bag limits.

We at *Hunting Dog* urge that you of Game Management give the idea of ONE BIRD FOR THE DOG your studied consideration. We sincerely believe that the sportsmen and conservationists of North America would thank you for showing the way.
